

Dear Parents and Carers

Parking

For the safety of all children and the road users, please could we ask parents/carers not to park near the junction with the main road. Doing so increases the difficulties accessing the school road and risk of an accident. Thank you

Highway Code - DO NOT stop or park:

- near a school entrance
- anywhere you would prevent access for Emergency Services
- at or near a bus or tram stop or taxi rank
- on the approach to a level crossing/tramway crossing
- opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, except in an authorised parking space

Book swap



Class Snippets - (Article 28- children have the right to an education. Article 29- Education should develop a child's talents, personalities and beliefs)

Pre-school – continuing on with our 'Wonders of the World' theme, we have been looking at snails. We have looked at non-fiction books and stories. The children have looked at snail shells and how they spiral which lead onto spiral mark making. We have looked at the famous art work 'The Snail' by Henri Matisse and the children have created their own versions of this by tearing up coloured paper and sticking the pieces onto paper. We have also taken part in dressing up, large scale drawing using wax crayons, playdough and outdoor play. Class 4 came to see us Monday afternoon to measure everyone's height and head span as part of their science work.

Class 1 – the children have been learning lots about animals and have been identifying and classifying different animals into their correct groups in science. All children have been working hard with their writing to get their stories finished in English and we can't wait to share them with each other when they're finished.

Reception sounds 'oa & er' and HFW's recap of 'look, now, down, see, going, just, have, it's, do, so'.

Class 2 – this week, we have been creating a final piece of work in art. The children have been using oil pastels and have been blending them to create a sky in the style of Van Gogh. They decided whether to create a night sky or a sunset and then set off to work with their ideas. In PE this week, we created a barn dance sequence and we were lucky enough to share it with Class 1. The children have worked really hard in PE this term and created dances for the different seasons.

Class 3 have really impressed me with their story writing this week. They have included all of the features taught this year in their writing and had brilliant plots based on The Last Garden. In maths, they have been working hard on fractions. For Y3, they have been comparing and ordering unit fractions and fractions with the same denominator. Y4s have impressed me with their knowledge of formal column addition, with regrouping. We had a fantastic afternoon sewing on Tuesday to make our purses. Some children included zips to close their purse. We will be evaluating them before half term so that children can bring them home to share. They worked really well together to support each other with threading needles and tying knots.

Class 4 have been learning lots this week. We have been planning for our Just So Stories, where the children will get to innovate their own character, with anthropomorphism, and create a story where there is a lesson to be learnt. The children were able to go around the school for Science, to gather data for a growth survey via measuring a variety of children and adults - we will be converting this data into a graph next week. At swimming, the children continue to impress the adults with their skills in the water - please can we ensure children are remembering their swimming kits for Tuesdays, and PE Kits for Fridays, thank you.

Reading cafe

Thank you to the families that came to join us for our reading cafe. The chicken enjoyed lots of non-fiction books this time and it was a great opportunity for parents to explore the library too. Our next reading cafe is Friday 15th March 2024.

National storytelling week

This week has been National storytelling week. We have been reading books each day chosen by a class teacher and shared around the school. We have been reading books about children with autism, dyslexia and hearing difficulties to celebrate diversity. The children have discussed Article 2 the right to non-discrimination and Article 23 including children with disabilities. They have had some mature conversations about including everyone and how we can adapt games and other situations so everyone can be involved.
